We were very enriched in the process and grateful for the relationship built up by the regional coordinators in each region.

In the month of September 2022, all staff of CMAI were given the opportunity to visit member institutions which had not been visited in the year 2022. **Sixteen staff visited 34 Member institutions covering 7 regions.** The outcome ranged from experiencing first class hospitality to seeing the actual ground reality challenges of our members. It was an all-round effective experience for our staff.

The Student Empowering and Enriching Directive (SEED) and CALL programmes were conducted **to ensure students and young professionals had a comprehensive understanding on the missions from stalwarts and were motivated to serve at some point in their careers.** Addressing emotional and mental challenges amongst these young adults and providing a platform to share concerns proved to be a step in the right direction for CMAI, given the pandemic aftereffects. **The in-person visits have brought to surface the usual challenges but there are new concerns too.**

Human resource, finances, sustainability of services and relevance are top on the list. The need for shifting from an institutionalised focused care model to more community and home-based care models is becoming evident. The mission of each hospital aligned to their respective memorandums needs to be revisited. **Are we still focused on the real need and vision of the hospital when it started or is there a dire need to change?**



Training in allied health care is another area of concern and the iron is hot. With the National Commission for Allied and Healthcare Profession in place, there is pressure for each state to make their respective councils and for the centre to transition from the Interim Council to the National Council, the final decision-making body under the Act. **CMAI is knocking at very door to ensure we stay on their radar and get the recognition we seek....and deserve.**

For the upcoming quarter, we look forward to the fellowship at the **combined National Conference scheduled from 10-12th November 2022.** May the good Lord guide the Chairpersons, Secretaries and Members of the Executive Committee under each Section to enable this National Conference to be a meaningful and valuable one. HEALTHCARE AND ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE TODAY! POTENTIAL TOMORROW

These days, we are hearing the terms artificial intelligence (AI) and machine learning (ML) rather frequently. We even have them and utilise them without even realising it. For instance, the picture of the lovely landscape we just captured was probably processed right away by our mobile phones to balance the brightness, contrast, and colour; that selfie we just took, removed all the blemishes from our face to make us look better and enhance our features.

These modern technologies seek to imitate cognitive processes in humans. Due to the expanding availability of healthcare data and the quick advancement of analytics techniques, these technologies are bringing about a paradigm shift in healthcare.

Let's explore the state of AI applications in healthcare today and talk about their potential in the future. A variety of healthcare data types can be processed using AI (structured and unstructured). Popular AI approaches include machine learning methods for structured data and natural language processing for unstructured data.

AI innovations have recently had a significant impact on the healthcare industry, prompting a lively debate on whether AI doctors would someday take the place of human doctors. While AI can help doctors make better clinical decisions or even replace human judgement in some functional areas of healthcare, we can safely say that human doctors won't be replaced by computers in the near future.

The recent effective implementations of AI in healthcare have been made possible by the expanding availability of healthcare data and the quick development of data analytic technologies. Strong AI algorithms can uncover clinically pertinent information hidden in the enormous amount of data with the help of pertinent clinical questions, which can then help with clinical decision-making.

What is the rationale behind using AI in healthcare? The benefits of AI have received a lot of attention in the medical literature. AI can employ complex algorithms to 'learn' characteristics from a wealth of healthcare data, and then apply the discovered knowledge to improve clinical practise.

Additionally, AI is capable of learning from mistakes and self-improving based on user feedback. An AI system can help doctors by delivering current medical knowledge from journals, books, and clinical settings to guide appropriate patient care. Additionally, an AI system can assist in lowering the unavoidable diagnostic and treatment errors that occur in human clinical practise. To help with real-time inferences for health risk alert and outcome prediction, an AI system also collects important data from a huge patient population.

Types of data that AI systems have analysed - Before AI systems can be used in healthcare applications, they need to be "trained" through data generated from clinical activities, such as screening, diagnosis, treatment assignment, and so on. This will allow them to identify similar

groups of subjects and associations between subject features and outcomes of interest. These clinical data frequently exist as demographic information, medical notes, electronic recordings from medical equipment, physical examinations, clinical laboratory data, and photographs, among other things.

A significant amount of the AI literature specifically examines data from electrodiagnosis, genetic testing, and diagnostic imaging at the diagnosis stage.

The other two main data sources are clinical laboratory results and notes from physical examinations. Large portions of them are unstructured narrative writings that cannot be directly analysed, such as clinical notes.


As a result, the corresponding AI applications concentrate on first turning the unstructured language into an electronic medical record (EMR) that can be understood by machines.

Even though AI technologies are receiving a lot of interest in medical research, practical application still faces challenges. The restrictions are the first obstacle. There are currently no guidelines for evaluating the effectiveness and safety of AI systems.

Data exchange presents the next obstacle. AI systems must be taught (constantly) using data from clinical research in order for the system to be developed and improved.

Our healthcare system is characterised by disparities in access, inadequate infrastructure, a shortage of qualified medical professionals, and minimal government spending.

Thus, the country with a population of over a billion people who have access to the internet and smartphones offers special prospects for the development of sustainable and scalable healthcare technology.



AI can help in early prediction of disease outbreaks and help adapt efficient use of resources.

Regarding AI's potential to transform the sector, it can help in the early prediction of disease outbreaks, remote diagnosis and treatment, and the efficient use of medical resources. Before the wider adoption of AI to deliver safe and equitable healthcare solutions, issues surrounding privacy, misuse, and responsibility must be given far more thorough and attention.

It would be really helpful to hear from those of you who have employed AI-based technology in your workflow about your experiences and opinions.

NATIONAL COMMISSION FOR ALLIED AND HEALTHCARE PROFESSIONS—AN UPDATE

The National Commission for Allied and Healthcare Professions bill was passed on 21st March 2021. The Ministry of Health and Family welfare formed the Interim commission on 21st September 2021. As per the act each state has to form the respective State Allied Health Council under the Central National Commission. Christian Medical Association of India has been following up with different State Government and the Central Government offices regarding the status of these councils. On 16th September 2022, CMAI General Secretary and AHP Secretary met Dr. Poona Meena the Deputy Secretary in the office of Ministry of Health, who is also in charge of the NC AHP Act 2021 implementation.

Dr Meena shared the following updates with us along with making few recommendations:

- The Interim commission for Allied Health Professionals has been fully functional with Chairperson Dr Manohar Agnani and Vice Chairperson Dr Neha Garg

- Three committees were formed to look after specific areas of the allied health commission; Committee I: Provisional registration and database for A&HP, Committee II: Database of institutions and qualifications (listing and verification) and Committee III: Curriculum Standardization and other related standards

- Till date the following four States only have formed the State Allied health Council as on September 2022; Andhra Pradesh, Telangana, Arunachal Pradesh and Uttar Pradesh

- On 20th September 2022, there will be an inter

im commission meeting to update on the progress of each committee.

- Dr Meena suggested us to reach out to Dr. Ms. Madhavi Konetigari (PhD), Professor & Principal (PT)-Sri Venkateshwara Institute of Medical Sciences (SVIMS)-Tirupati (Physiotherapy) for guidance regarding the recognition of CMAI_CEB Courses. Dr Konetigari is heading the Andhra Pradesh State Allied Health Council and is part of the second committee titled- "Database of Institutions and Qualifications."

- To visit Dr. Manohar Agnani the Chairperson of Interim Council after the 20th September 2022. The meeting will shed more clarity on the proceedings and how CMAI_CEB can fit into the system.

- Government wants to expedite the Council Implementation process, however, the states are posing a challenge and not cooperating as per expectations.

- The Ministry initially will recognize 10 broad categories of Job roles by forming 10 councils specific for each job role. Eventually, also look for more expertise to

support the council.

- The proposed Central and State Allied health registry is still under process.

Based on the valuable advice from Dr Meena, the CMAI team visited Dr Manohar Agnani. The Chairperson of the Interim Commission of Allied and Healthcare Professions on 20th October 2022. Dr. Agnani was very positive and assured that the government will definitely consider the recogni

tion of genuine training providers like CMAI. He also mentioned that the priority of the interim commission is to form the National Commission as they will be the decision-making body related to all allied health matters. He encouraged our network to apply for the position of Chairperson and Secretary of the National Commission. The notification has been published in the MoH website.

Ms Kavita Narayan from the MoH asked CMAI to submit the details of expertise in the different job roles as the National Commission will be forming different councils under it with multiple expert

committees. We have already submitted 6 CVs of experts from the Medical Laboratory filed to Dr Geetha, member of one of the committees under the interim commission.

At the Allied Health Professionals Section, we request your continuous prayer support for this recognition efforts.

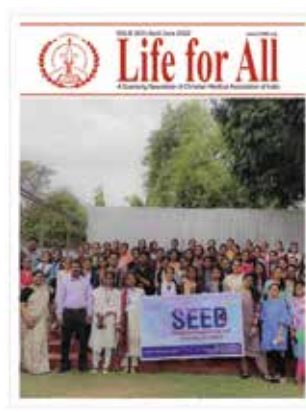

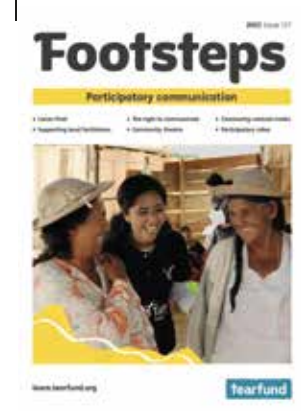
